

MINISTRY OF PRAISE—A WORD FROM DEACON FILIPS

Greetings Fellow Prayer Warriors!

We recently had the Gospel story about the rich young man who went away sad when Jesus told him that the final thing he had to do to inherit eternal life was to sell his possessions, give the money to the poor and follow Jesus.

This rich young man seems like a good person. He follows the Ten Commandments and the hundreds of particular Jewish laws. His question shows his good heart, he wants to be perfect in God's eyes, as God deserves. Jesus gives him an extremely difficult requirement that is almost guaranteed to lead to failure. What is going on? Since almost all of us are rich by the standards of Jesus' day, is Jesus saying we're all doomed if we don't give away all of our property and cash out all of our savings?

No. Men and women who enter professed religious life do dispose of all of their worldly goods and depend on their community to live, but the rest of us, including diocesan priests and bishops, do not have to. We need to understand that wealth is neither good nor bad; it is the trust in riches that keeps men out of heaven. Luke calls him a "rich man" because that is the description that is most important to HIM, and Jesus knew that the man's love of his wealth was greater than his love of God. Jesus says that those who trust in God will be saved. The church has lots of Saints who were wealthy kings and queens. There are plenty of rich people in the Bible with whom God is pleased. Joseph of Arimathea who provided the burial tomb for Jesus, and King Solomon was the richest man of his time, were favored by God.

So, we should examine our conscience; What is taking the place of our trust in God? Is it wealth in our retirement account? Maybe it's our possessions? Our farm or business? Our work ethic? Our competence? Our pride? What prevents us from depending on God for the most important thing, which is our salvation? Do I cling to the gifts or the giver? There is a story of an African monkey who can be harvested by putting tin foil in a trap with a small hole. They reach in to grab the foil and make fist so they cannot remove their hand. The monkey is trapped and will sit there holding that shiny foil until the hunter comes. What shiny thing are we holding onto that is trapping us and keeping us from heaven?

This month lets pray for our state and country, that the elections have a pro-life result. Following is the continuation of the chapter on Protestantism from my book "Pearls of the Universal Church" available from www.spiritualworkspress.com

Sola Scriptura, (the distinctive Protestant teaching that all matters of faith must come from the Bible alone without reference to Sacred Tradition or the Pope and Bishops), began with Martin Luther who started the Protestant rebellion. He was rebelling against legitimate issues of corruption in the Catholic Church, but he also rebelled against the authority of the Church.

Luther and his followers did not allow for any Church authority to interpret the Bible. He said that all people get to read the Bible and decide for themselves what it means. Therefore, every Christian has to be a theologian and a Bible expert. The average Christian has no expertise to do this. An infallible document (scripture) requires an infallible interpreter (the Catholic Church). There are many ways to interpret different parts of the Bible and readers pull out isolated verses to "prove" contradicting ideas. This leads to infinite splitting of the Church. D. A. Carson said, "A text without a context is a pretext." A Catholic always looks at Bible passages in the larger context of Sacred Scripture and at what the Church teaches about that passage.

OACCW NEWS

St. Mary's Altar Society hosted the Rural Northwest Deanery fall meeting Oct 15. They opened the day with a rolls and fruit, and a coffee bar.

Guest speaker was Deacon Roger Filips who spoke about prayer and spirituality. He stressed that the Mass is the highest form of prayer, and that God is waiting to hear from His people. He reminded the ladies that God wants to hear their complaints, anxieties, apologies, petitions, and praise, that He wants to be in relationship and conversation with them. He encouraged them reflect each night on 3 ways they cooperated with God, 2 ways they didn't, and 1 way they can do better tomorrow.

Judy Arlt reported for the Spirituality Commission. She passed out meditations for Pro Life Stations of the Cross, and led discussion on Initiatives 434 and 439. She invited all to join her in a prayer to defeat the pro-abortion initiative 439.

Judy Krysl reported for Service and Leadership Commissions. She talked about traits of a good leader, and encouraged attendees to make their 'God list' bigger than their 'worry list'. For service, she made seasonal suggestions like "Booing" neighbors with a plate of goodies, helping others get to vote, and ways to remember others during the holidays.

Theresa Pavlik gave the Legislative Report. She shared a Catholic Charities address where money can be sent to help hurricane victims, how to pack Boxes of Joy for the underprivileged at Christmas, and reviewed how her parish in Verdigre does its diaper drive. She talked about supporting school choice by contributing to the Opportunity Scholarship program, and encouraged the ladies to vote 'retain' on School Choice Initiative 435 in this fall's election.

Kim Estes, past president of the Omaha Archdiocese Council of Catholic Women, reported on the group's 100th Convention held in September in Norfolk. Winner of the prestigious Muller Award was Mary Jo (Schaaf) Hamik, who was born and raised in Emmet and now resides in Norfolk with her husband Brian, who is a Stuart native.

St. Boniface ladies will host all Catholic women at the OACCW Fall meeting Nov 12 starting with registration at 9:30. Guest speakers are Kelli Tomjack on Serving God, and Cathy Minchow on the Christian Encounter Christ (CEC) retreats. Mass will be celebrated at 11:30. This is open to all.
